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CONTAGIOUS GOOD NEWS

As the Novel Coronavirus progresses across the globe, people are gripped with a fear bordering on panic. I am writing from Southeast Asia where many countries have canceled flights to China and other countries in an attempt to control the spread of the dreaded disease. Face



masks are sold out, body temperatures are checked in malls, and social media is alive with chatter about controlling the outbreak. One TCM field reports that church attendance is down by one-third. Another missionary reports that all schools have been closed, including their language school.

Mission is centered on the hope of the gospel. In Swahili 'gospel' is translated as *habari njema*, literally 'good news.' The underlying fact of human existence is that all of us have an appointment with "the grim reaper." The statistical probability of dying from the Coronavirus is tiny. Yet, each one of us has one physical death—and only one—awaiting us. Hebrews states that "*people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment.*" In spite of the increasingly scientific human efforts to discover the tree of life, the death rate is still one apiece. God's declaration to the first man remains true, "*By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return.*"

The gospel holds out hope to mankind. I love the words of Jesus to Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Wow! The power in those words is something humans can only dream about. And the gospel is full of that same promise. "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Apostle Paul introduces his second letter to Timothy with "the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus" and later states that our Savior "has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel."

Like the Coronavirus, the gospel is designed to be communicated and to spread across the world. Unlike the Coronavirus which produces fear and death, the gospel of Jesus Christ gives hope and life. Although the world will always have another sickness to deal with, the final solution remains the same. As Paul told a man in Philippi who had lost hope, "Believe on the Lord Jesus and you will be saved!" How communicable is your gospel?

"But the eyes of the LORD are on those who fear him, on those whose hope is in his unfailing love, to deliver them from death and keep them alive in famine." (Psalm 33:18–19) �

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WHY MISSION IS URGENT NOT OPTIONAL TO THE LOCAL CHURCH

Heach in different regions of the country, I can personally testify to the essential nature of cross-cultural missions to the health and vitality of the local church. Here

are 7 reasons why mission enhances the entire ministry of the church in the community and beyond, and also serves as an anchor to the heart and soul of the pastor as primary leader of the assembly. This is why mission is urgent, not optional for your local church.

1. MISSION OPENS THE EYES TO SEE HOW GOD IS AT WORK IN THE WORLD -

God's mighty hand is providentially opening doors of opportunity for the gospel in this age of grace. Testimonies from missionaries confirm this reality, opening the eyes to a sensitive awareness of God's active intervention in the affairs of mankind, and cultivating a life of faith in the Word of God.

2. MISSION BECKONS THE HEART TO BE MORE DELIBERATE IN PRAYER – If you believe in mission, then pray for mission. In other words, if you believe people are hell-bound as spiritually lost sinners and therefore in urgent need of Jesus Christ, then pray for missionaries who are taking the gospel into the darkness of this world. Prayer is the mighty engine at the heart of mission.

3. MISSION CHALLENGES THE HANDS BE MORE RADICALLY GENEROUS – Let's be honest...regardless of the demographics of your church and its socio-economic status, we prioritize what is really important to us. The time, talent, and treasure of our lives are a stewardship that ought to be missionally invested in eternity. Every believer is accountable before Christ at the Bema.

4. MISSION STIRS THE MIND TO COMPREHEND THE BREADTH OF THE CHURCH, THE BODY OF CHRIST – God's love and grace is for the nations, and His redeemed people are among every tribe, language, and people group worldwide. American Christians tend to have a very limited perspective of the width, length, depth and height of the love of Christ. Mission gives a proper understanding. 5. MISSION MOTIVATES THE FEET TO INTENTIONALLY GO PLACES WITH THE **GOSPEL OF GRACE** – Tyranny of the urgent enslaves many into merely going through the daily motions of life. Mission challenges apathy, indifference, and hardness of heart to be broken in humility before God and to raise the white flag of surrender to Christ's commission of grace. Being compelled to move forward with the gospel is not so much a matter of calling but of faithful obedience. 6. MISSION IGNITES A PASSION OF SOUL TO LIVE ON MISSION IN THE **COMMUNITY & BEYOND – There is nothing like mission to enlarge our** perspective of what local church ministry could be even in this culture. Mission injects fresh wisdom to understand the times, vision to see beyond what is to what ought to be, and courage to initiate decisive action for the glory of God. 7. MISSION EXPANDS THE LIFE OF AN ASSEMBLY TO IMPACT THE NATIONS FOR GOD'S GLORY – As the pillar and ground of doctrinal truth, the local church is a counter-cultural out-post, strategically positioned in the community and divinely ordained to impact the lives of people in all nations worldwide for the glory of God. Does the mission of your church need expansion to line up with God's heart for the local church? *

A LOST SHEEP

A man who called himself "A Lost Sheep" for 38 years: Mr. Chin Bunthoeun is a 60 year-old man with a heart disease. He can't walk well and his whole body, especially his two hands, keep shaking. He heard about Jesus Christ when he was 20 years old but since then he got a good position in the government Ministry of the Interior. He was rich and powerful, but he never went to church or had any relationship with God for 38 years. He didn't even care about his faith—that is why he told us that he was "A Lost Sheep."

Since he was in power and rich he had two wives. One passed away, and the other one looked down on him because of his sickness that caused him to lose his power and property. They separated a few weeks ago. He had no other place to stay during this terrible time, so he came to stay with his daughter as a new neighbor of mine. Two of her daughters are our students and attend Cambodia Grace Gospel Church.

The problems with his family and health brought Mr. Chin down to almost a zero point. He told us he felt hopeless and didn't know what to do besides wait for death. But our God was at work. Even though most of our young church members are busy with work and study and don't have enough time for outreach activity, our elder members have time. Praise God that He can still use these three old ladies. They went to visit Mr. Chin and offered him their prayers and kindheartedness which made him feel warm and cared for, especially as he is a new visitor and it was his first time to this village.



This Sunday afternoon before our worship service, one of his granddaughters asked him, "Do you want to go to church and join in worship with us today?" He said when he heard this invitation from his granddaughter, he was shocked, and it reminded him about "A Lost Sheep" in Matthew 18:13-15. He didn't know where

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his strength would come from, but he said "Yes" to his granddaughters, and they helped carry him along with his walking stick.

He told us this was his first joyful heart in his despair, especially when he saw some of us run to help carry him and give him a seat. God can make even a small thing like this an expression of great affection to people.

After the worship service, we spent more time for chit chat, and Mr. Tou and I offered him another prayer for his health and for his relationship with God. I also gave him a new Bible. He told us it will be his 2nd Bible after 38 years, and he will try to read it as he can still read nowadays.





THREE CRITICAL QUESTIONS

have been connected and involved with Things to Come Mission in one form or another since 1981, when, after graduating from college, I visited the Philippines as a short-term missionary. 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DEALING WITH A DIFFICULT DIAGNOSIS

Jim Tollar is pastor of Grace Bible Church in Beloit, WI and Business Manager at Berean Bible Society. He has served on the TCM Board since 2015 and spent a year in Kenya as a TCM missionary. Jim and his wife, Missy, have a daughter and twin sons.



As ambassadors for the Lord Jesus Christ, we have a wonderful message of reconciliation to proclaim to a lost and dying world. We also have a responsibility to be faithful stewards of the mysteries of God (1 Cor. 4:1,2) for it is God's desire for "all to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4). Each of my ministries represents "the preaching of Jesus Christ, according to the revelation of the mystery" (Rom. 16:25), and they have allowed me to be part of the Lord's work in spreading the Gospel of the Grace of God locally, across the USA, and around the world.

This past November I was diagnosed with Primary Progressive Multiple Sclerosis (MS), which makes it difficult to walk long distances or stand for a long period of time. I was asked recently whether I think this is some sort of punishment from God, and what impact this diagnosis might have on the ministries in which I'm involved.

When I first received the news, these same two questions crossed my mind. In addressing the former, I know this is NOT a punishment from God. In the dispensation of Grace, God is not dealing with the Body of Christ as He did with the nation of Israel. God is not "spanking" us as He did when He was angry with the nation of Israel (or Gentile nations) under His prophetic program. In His dealings with Israel, God always sent a prophet to tell the lawbreaker what sin had been committed and what the punishment would entail (i.e. Jonah & Nineveh; Nathan & David; the prophets & 12 Tribes of Israel). Today, God is not angry with the Body of Christ (Romans 5:1), and now it is God's Word that **teaches** us how to live (Titus 2:12—teach and chasten are the same word in Greek). God's Word is complete; there are no "new messages" from a prophet to tell the believer what he/she might have done wrong to warrant punishment. Because of all this, I have the assurance that God is not angry with me and is not punishing me with illness for any certain sin.

As to the other question, what impact will this diagnosis have on my ministries, I must admit, I'm still not sure. When Missy and I visited South Africa this past December, where I was guest speaker at the first annual GOMSA conference, I had to use a wheelchair in the airport terminal and had to sit while teaching at the conference. I thank the Lord that apart from these instances, it was not difficult to get around and minister the Word. Through this ordeal the Lord has reminded me of many things, things all of us need to be reminded of every day no matter the circumstances in our lives, whether good or bad:

- 1. God's grace is sufficient (2 Cor. 12:9).
- 2. Life is short, "redeem the time because the days are evil" (Eph. 5:16).
- 3. Proclaim the Word and don't get distracted by other issues (2 Tim. 4:2).
- Look for that "blessed hope" & the redemption of these sin-cursed bodies (Titus 2:13; Rom. 8:23).

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- 5. In everything give thanks to God—this is His will (1 Thes. 5:18).
- 6. Do ALL things without complaining (Phil. 2:14). 🛠

BENEFITS OF MISSIONARY VISITS

As a pastor, I believe having missionaries visit your church is important for a number of reasons. People want to know and shake hands with those they pray for and support. Whether supporting a missionary directly or indirectly, seeing or hearing how contributions are used allows one to have more intimate involvement in their ministry. As much as I, as a pastor, can attempt to convey the successes and needs of missionaries, there is no replacement to meeting those who are living and experiencing it.

Even if a church believes itself not in a position to help financially, I hope they would still invite missionaries to come and share, as you never know the effect it may have on your group. Maybe the seed will be planted for the next missionary or the inspiration to support when the possibility presents itself. Don't put God in a box, as He "is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Eph 3:20).

It is also important to consider the benefit to the missionaries of being welcomed into a church. Mission work can be tough. As a pastor, I know that there are difficult times in ministry, and the Lord has used others to encourage me. These were important and needed moments. Meeting fellow saints who are praying and following along with their work allows the missionaries to see firsthand the community of support they have, and be encouraged as a result. It allows them to be appreciated for the work they are doing for our Savior.

I have always been thankful and inspired when missionaries visit and look forward to the next one. *

Growing up as a pastor's kid, my dad was my hero. I remember so vividly the night he shared God's salvation message and led me in the prayer to accept Christ's atoning sacrifice. His commitment to Christ and his dedication to sharing God's Grace really inspired me to follow in his footsteps, which is why I enrolled at Grace Bible College straight from high school. However, it didn't take long for me to realize that being a pastor required gifts I did not possess.

As I read in Romans 12:6, I know the gifts God has given me are to be used. Sometimes the gifts we receive equip us best for the small behind-the-scenes tasks, or sometimes they suit us best for pastoring a church or serving as a missionary in a foreign land. Serving on the Board of TCM, in truth, is humbling. I get the opportunity to learn in great detail what all our missionaries are doing. I see their dedication, their sacrifice, their great ability to share God's wonderful love through His Son and our Savior Jesus Christ. I see the lost, being found. I see hundreds of people giving sacrificially of their finances to ensure this message of God's Grace is shared to the unreached regions of the world. I work alongside such tremendously gifted men and women who work so hard to further this ministry. So yes, I am humbled, but also grateful and encouraged, and so very thankful that I am allowed to contribute.

I do not know where God will lead, or what new work he will lay before me, but I pray I will follow the example of our faithful missionaries and always respond to his calling with a willing heart.


FOLLOWING ON ...


